

This report provides a measure of the lobbying activity directed toward specific proposals that were before Wisconsin's legislature during the 1999-2000 legislative session. Each of the 629 organizations that employed lobbyists in Wisconsin during the 1999-2000 legislative session has reported to the Ethics Board the number of hours and dollars it spent on lobbying-related efforts. Each also provided the Ethics Board with its estimate of the portion of its lobbying efforts associated with specific proposals.




